- Sing songs learned with my class. (e.g., Mnohaya Lita, O Canada, Christmas carols, other cultural songs).
- Ask and answer basic questions that are part of a daily routine at school (e.g., day, month, weather, colour of my clothes, homework, sports, snack-time).
- Give information about myself (e.g. name, grade, age, phone number, address, family members, hobbies).

I can:

- Use simple words to describe something familiar to me.
- Ask and answer basic questions about what I like and don't like.
- Ask for or provide basic directions to a familiar location.
- State phone number(s), calendar dates, time of day, basic prices.
- Convey immediate needs and ask for assistance.
- Carry on a basic conversation (e.g., greetings, 2-3 questions, responses, and farewell).
- Respond to questions about a short, simple text using phrases or sentences taken from the text.
- Repeat and use grammatical structures that have been modelled in the classroom (e.g., simple sentences on familiar topics).
- Orally categorize vocabulary on familiar topics (e.g., matching exercise, cloze exercise, yes-no game)

I can:

Share basic information about a topic I know well orally.

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- Use others' speech as a support or model for responses.
- Ask a series of questions about an unknown topic of study (e.g., 5 Ws: who, what, where, when, why).
- Ask questions or state basic facts about something that has occurred or will occur (e.g., school event, weather forecast, community festival, family event).
- Use simple sentences to state an opinion and justify it (e.g., I like/don't like... because..., I usually go to/ and not to...because...).
- Use grammatical structures learned in class when speaking about familiar topics (errors are expected, particularly verb tenses, pronouns, declensions).

- Share information about my free time, family time, or time spent with friends.
- Share highlights of a book, movie, or event experienced in English.
- Experiment with vocabulary used to debate a viewpoint.
- Talk about personal feelings or emotions in Ukrainian.
- Communicate fluently and confidently about daily events, familiar topics, and personal interests.
- Apply grammatical structures learned in class when speaking about unfamiliar topics (some errors are expected; fluency and accuracy have not been reached at this stage).

I can:

- Use language skills fluently and accurately to give a presentation about a familiar topic.

- Locate basic information on a required topic (e.g, Canada, Ukraine, climate change, performing artists) in print or online.
- Read brief subject-specific texts on familiar topics, accompanied by pictures or diagrams.

I can:

- Follow printed instructions for classroom activities (e.g., art project, science experiment).
- Use everyday reference material in print and online (e.g., phone book, catalogue, Google search, Wikkipedia).
- Understand the main points in personal communication (e.g., letter, invitation, email message) about a known topic or event.
- Read and understand printed text that uses familiar phrases, sentence patterns, and vocabulary.
- Understand the main points in short articles and reports on topics of personal interest.
- Scan basic printed or online material to determine whether the information is interesting or useful to me.
- Understand school readings that contain subject specific vocabulary and some pictures or diagrams.
- Determine whether a piece of writing has been written to inform, to entertain, or persuade.

I can:

- Form letters appropriately.
- Use left to right printing patterns.
- Copy letters or words from the board.
- Distinguish between capital and lower case letters.
- Label familiar objects.
- Copy names of friends or family members.
- Print simple phrases or sentences from the board.
- Transfer words seen in print to writing.
- Use capitals and punctuation in a simple sentence or question.
- Construct 1-2 sentences about a familiar topic using vocabulary learned at school.
- Attempt to spell new words using the sound/symbol system in Ukrainian.
- Write a negative sentence using the word 'не'.
- Write a simple sentence to state a like or dislike.
- Use a very simple graphic organizer to copy key words in appropriate categories.
- Fill in a simple form asking for name, grade, age, or other basic details about myself.

- Write 2-3 sentences about myself, my family, friends, or things I like to do.
- Fill in a form with basic information about myself.
- Use a graphic organizer to identify key vocabulary.
- Write about a topic of interest using words and phrases drawn from memory.
- Write words and simple phrases about everyday objects.
- Use spacing, capitalization, and punctuation with reasonable accuracy.
- Write on a known topic by using familiar, modelled sentence patterns.
- Write a brief text about a favourite activity.
- Describe, using basic words and phrases, a family member or close friend.
- Make attempts at subject-verb agreement in simple sentences.
- Incorporate pronoun-verb declension patterns learned in class into writing.
- Use the negative 'не' within a sentence accurately.
- Attempt to self-correct grammatical errors in written work by asking questions, using charts, diagrams, or notes presented in class.

- Use knowledge of Ukrainian phonetics to write unfamiliar words (expect spelling errors).

I can:

 Write a brief message to friends or family (e.g., postcard, email, text message).

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- Use a graphic organizer to identify key vocabulary beyond basic nouns.
- Construct short sentences about familiar or favourite things using words drawn from memory.
- Use basic language conventions (spacing, capitalization, punctuation) accurately.
- Demonstrate growing accuracy when using Ukrainian grammatical structures.
- Use some descriptive vocabulary to express thoughts (expect language errors in descriptive writing).
- Write a brief text on a selected topic, based on a prompt given in class (prompts may include: news articles, photographs, drawings, a family treasure or special item, etc.)
- Enter newly learned terms into a personal dictionary (print or electronic) or vocabulary journal.
- Use simple information from print and online sources to write a brief text about a familiar topic (e.g., weather report, event announcement).
- Self-correct grammatical errors in written work (e.g., ask questions, use reference charts, dictionaries, or notes presented in class).
